Strengths of the school:

We were delighted with your feedback about the strengths of our school, with many of you making reference to the following areas: helpful and understanding staff, quality of teaching, progress of the children, rights respecting, community/family orientated, pupil focused, safety, promotion of equality, diversity and inclusion, strong leadership, organisation, parent workshops and parental support, approachability.

Individual parents made reference to areas such as daily reading, support for SEND, phonics grouping, charity work, attendance, open-door approach, healthy eating at lunchtime.

Areas where you think we could improve:

Thank you for your feedback about the areas in which we could improve. The only area that was mentioned a few times was related to communication about your child's progress, with suggestions such as an extra parents evening or drop-in sessions.

Other areas that individual parents mentioned included: food from different cultures, extra-curricular activities, lunchtime support, homework, feedback from clubs, start time aligned to the Juniors, access to water, friendship club for after school, bullying, teaching another language, staff diversity, daily worksheets for children to complete at home, car parking for parents, bus route to the school, increased access to sport.
